Masks

Mariam interviewing Marianna

Editorial team member Mariam interviews new 2nd year student Marianna Pldlubna

Mariam: Hi Marianna, we are so happy to talk to you today and to find out more about you Hello, my name is Marianna Pidlubna. I am 14 years old, and I am from Odesa in the south of Ukraine and now I am temporarily staying in Ireland.

Mariam: was it hard for you to leave your country?

It was quite hard for me to leave my country because of a couple of reasons. One is my family-my dad, and the rest of my family are still there, so it was quite hard to leave them. Also, the distance between Ireland and Ukraine, it was quite hard to get from Ukraine to Ireland, so we were going by car through all different countries, and it was quite stressful.

Mariam: Do you feel safe?

Yes, I feel safe in Ireland now. I am in a safe place because for now, in Ukraine it is extremely dangerous.

Mariam: Was it difficult to start education in a different system?

Yes, for me it was extremely hard in September to start a new school. I am from a different nationality and needed to escape the war situation that I have in my country. And at that time, I had no friends I did not know anyone, the different languages and different people have different systems, yes it was hard for me at first. Even though I had quite a good level of English and knew the basics, but I didn't understand half of what people were saying and I was very quiet.

Mariam: How different is Ukrainian school to our school?

To be honest it was hard for me. Because the schools are totally different. We have fewer lessons per day, we have more subjects and more and more tests and actually. We usually do not get exams at the end of the year, but we get more tests in the term. To be honest, I like the Irish education system more than the Ukrainian. In Ukraine we have so many subjects like all the branches of science and the same for history. We have history of the world and history of Ukraine. But I really like the way the Irish people study.

Mariam: What challenges did you face?

I think one of them was the English language, it was hard for me at first because my brain was mentally thinking in Ukrainian which was hard to switch on and switch off Ukrainian and start speaking English. I had a good level in English. But still not the best when you're in an area with native speakers. It is hard try to understand what they are saying.

Mariam: What do you like about BCS?

I liked how the school looks like in the inside and on the outside, it's also really modern. I like the teachers that I have-they're really good and I like that they are young compared to Ukrainian teachers. I like the way the teach the students it's really light and easy and not as stressful as in Ukrainian school. The system of education goes slow and is reliable so you can relax, and rest and you have lots of holidays!

Mariam: Do you think that BCS welcomed you well?

Yes, the school, the Principal, and the Year Head were doing everything for me to make me comfortable. And they always ask me how I am getting on etc. And I get lots of support. But it was still very hard at first. So, I had a stressful feeling because it was so different. But the school they did a lot to make me feel comfortable and help me all they could.

Mariam: Finally thank you Marianna for your time, we are so delighted to have you with us in BCS, best wishes to meet your family again, with sincere wishes that the war will end soon, and peace will return to your country.

BT Young Scientist 2023

Our TY science students did the whole school community proud by reaching the National Final of the BT Young Scientist Competition.

The experiment "Plants can change the way you sleep" was conducted by TY students Sarah McSweeney and Nik Adani. The girls discovered that having lavender plants in your room results in the best quality sleep, with the next best plant to have in your room was any green-leafed plant.

Evie Burke, Senan Nakamaija and Julia Oszczan conducted an investigation titled "The perception of beauty through the eyes of children". This was a modern continuation of an experiment from the 1940s, previously conducted by scientists Kenneth and Mamie Clark. The students presented young children with dolls of different skin colours and different general appearance. They asked the children questions like, "Which doll do you want to play with the most?" and "Which doll is the prettiest?". The results showed that the children were more likely to choose the dolls that looked like them.

Aoife Skinner carried out her project on 'Prejudice against modern foreign languages in Music' whereby she carried out research into the popularity of music in different world languages.

The effects of frequent reading on academic success were researched by Aoife de Baròid and Blàithin Browne. Interestingly their project concluded that the subject English was the only subject that profits from reading. Well done to all students
