

Celebrating Ms. Lowney's Retirement 2022

Kathleen hails from Castletownbere and in 1983 she Graduated from UCC with an honours degree in History and English. As many will know, the 80's are remembered as decade of recession, unemployment and emigration. Following her graduation, jobs were difficult to come by and Kathleen was fortunate to get subbing in Catletownbere, Bandon and Fermoy. However, like many young Irish she was forced to emigrate to England in 1985. She immediately secured a teaching position in a convent in Sittingbourne, Kent. After two years, she moved to St. Teresa's Boarding School in Effingham, Surrey. In her 11 years in St. Teresa's she made an outstanding contribution to student's education and formation. She was instrumental in many school tours but arguably she made her greatest impact as an English teacher teaching students to A level. While here she developed an interest in Guidance and in 1998 made the difficult decision to leave a permanent job & return home to complete a Masters in Career Guidance Counselling in UCC. The Community School Sector was the great beneficiary of that decision. Following her completion of the masters, her aptitudes as a Career Guidance Councillor were immediately recognised by Ted Owens in Glanmire Community School from 1999-2002. In 2002 she was appointed as Deputy Principal of Maria Immaculata Community College, Dunmanway where she faced the many challenges which the amalgamation of schools brought with it. Two short years later, in 2004 she was appointed as Principal of our very own Ballincollig Community School.

Kathleen leaves behind her a wonderful legacy after her 18 years of service to Ballincollig Community school. In her time in BCS she has formed wonderful partnerships and friendships with the four deputy Principals who worked with her. The staff over the last 18 years have benefitted immensely from her experience, her expertise, her time, her generosity, her wisdom, advice and direction but above all her kind nature, listening ear, approachability, understanding and supportive nature. The many positive comments and fond memories of Kathleen which have been shared since the announcement of her retirement is testimony to the esteem and respect she has earned during her long and illustrious career.

The beauty of Kathleen's leadership was she always gave teachers the freedom pursue projects, initiatives and programmes which we were passionate about and which she knew would be beneficial to our students. While pursuing these passions she was always gave staff the opportunity to learn by giving us the space to use our own initiative, while always being available to offer advice, support and direction when required. The trust that she has in her staff's ability can be seen in the number of successful teams and programmes across all disciplines within the school.

A proud Munster supporter, her love for Rugby is reflected in her establishment of BCS's first Rugby team. Her commitment to charity is evident from the many charity initiatives that were pursued under her guidance. Her passion for student travel, which began in her early years of teaching was reignited again in 2018 when she accompanied 16 students to Kolkata on the Hope Immersion Programme. Her dedication to the Community is more than apparent from the strong links the school has forged with local business', groups and sporting organisations. While her devotion to student development, formation, happiness, academic achievement, sporting excellence and wellbeing is more then apparent from the sheer volume of happy and successful students who have excelled while attending BCS during her principal ship.

The pressures, burdens and responsibilities she has carried and faced in the last 18 years as principal have been immense and at times must have been overwhelming. The burden of responsibility must have at times kept her awake at night, and for carrying that burden, we the staff and students of BCS are extremely grateful. Kathleen has navigated Ballincollig Community School through intense educational change including curricular, assessment and technological reform. She has also guided the school, its staff, students and parents through social change, economic challenges, legal changes in education and the ever evolving issues affecting students and school life. We take this opportunity to congratulate and acknowledge the contribution Kathleen has made to Ballincollig Community School. Kathleen can take great pride in what she has achieved in her 38 years in the Education sector. Your tireless work, commitment and dedication to Ballincollig Community School is greatly appreciated and we wish you every happiness in the next chapter of your life.

Conscientious, hardworking, efficient and full of charisma there was no doubt that he would excel quickly and in 1990 he was appointed Director of Adult Education in BCS. In 1993, John was appointed House Exam secretary, a position he would hold for the next decade. It is hard to believe that while holding all these positions and juggling a very busy family life, John still found time to further his own education completing a Masters in Education and a higher diploma in Special Education in his early years in BCS.

His hard work, skills and dedication to student achievement were recognised when in 2003 he was selected as co-ordinator of Special Education in BCS. His sensitivity for those who needed help, his pleasant and helpful manner, his excellent teaching capabilities and his commitment to passing on the highest standards to his pupils are among his finest qualities as a teacher, qualities which made him perfect for a career in Special Educational needs.

Mr. Buttimer was appointed Year head in 2008 a position of great trust and sensitivity. He was charged with the responsibility to lead young minds, to ensure their academic and extracurricular success, to help them navigate their way through challenging times, to create lifelong memories, to draw the students together with the ultimate aim of them forging close bonds and long lasting friendships. He has undoubtedly achieved those aims as a year head. His accomplishments with his year groups are evident from the fantastic young adults under his guidance who have graduated from BCS.

In recognising your contribution to BCS it would be remiss of us not to recognise and express sincere gratitude for the epic ski trips which you have spent months organising for your year groups. The time, effort, stress and hard work involved in these trips are immense, however it is hard work which reaped incredible reward when you see the fantastic effect these trips had on students and groups attending.

It would also be neglectful not to mention your superb soccer skills (skills which apparently you acquired thanks to childhood games on the green in Glasheen with Ms. Arslan). Your love and passion for Soccer, you shared freely with your students, training many teams throughout your years in BCS. Skills which you often utilised to annihilate 6th year teams in the end of year match. Students have gained incredible skills, passion and fantastic memories from your contribution to soccer in BCS, with many of them going on to acquire Soccer Scholarships in Universities, because of the time and energy you invested in extra-curricular.

Our students have all expressed their sadness at your retirement but also gratitude to you Mr. Buttimer, for all you have done for them. Your enthusiasm, energy, sense of humour, big heart, compassion and empathy has had made a lasting impact on the students & staff of Ballincollig Community School over the last 37 years. We would like to express our sincere gratitude for your vast contribution to Ballincollig Community School over the last 37 years, not only to the academic life of all the students who were in your care, but for every other aspect of school-life where you were generous with your time, your energy and your gifts. You shared so much with management, staff, pupils and their parents alike and for that we are eternally grateful.

Newly Developed Facilities

Our newly renovated Library, a project which was spearheaded by our student council and funded by Tomar Trust has been completed. The school has also invested in new equipment for the gym, to make it fully functional. The newly renovated and modernised gym with updated equipment is now now accessible to senior cycle PE classes so they can gain the skills necessary for using gym equipment safely. Numerous outdoor eating areas have been created for students to socialise outdoors during break times. A covered walkway was built connecting Corridor A to Corridor C, which facilitates the free and quick movement between corridors. Many of these projects have been funded by the Tomar Trust, funding for which we are extremely grateful.
